No. No. His next project was to drive Route 66.

**Was he planning to go to a deserted island?**

No. He wasn't planning to go to a deserted island. He was planning to drive Route 66.

**Was he going to fly above Route 66?**

No. No. He wasn't going to fly above Route 66. He was planning to drive Route 66.

**Did Clint arrive in New York?**

No. Clint didn't talk to the press for 2 hours. He didn't talk to the press at all.

**Was he eager to see something?**

Yes. He was eager to see the ocean again.

**Who didn't talk to the press? Who?**

Clint. Clint didn't talk to the press.

Clint became famous and rich, and now he plans to sail around the world.

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**Clint became poor. Right?**

No. No. Clint didn't become poor. He became rich.

**Where did he plan to sail?**

He planned to sail around the world.

**Is he planning to stay at home?**

No. No. He's not planning to stay at home. He's planning to sail around the world.
