#6 Improves our mood

Playing an instrument can help with stress, and depression because it acts as an outlet for difficult emotions.

It can be a way to calm down in difficult situations and a healthy distraction on a stressful day.

In short, playing an instrument has all kinds of positive **benefits on our mood**.

#7 It makes you creative

Mini-Story

(Practice your speaking)

What's a mini-story?

A mini-story is very simple. I give you information using phrases, and then I ask you questions.

After each question, there will be some seconds of silence: it's your turn to answer the question!

Just try to give an easy and short answer. Not a complex one.

After your answer, I'll give you the correct answer.

And just like that, I'll tell a story with questions and answers.

Are you ready?

A group of five friends decide to play a musical instrument.

Are they friends or family?

Friends. They are friends.

How many friends decide to learn to play an instrument?

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Five. All five friends decide to learn to play an instrument.

What do all five friends decide to learn?

All five friends decide to learn to play a musical instrument.

They set themselves a challenge: Each friend will learn to play a musical instrument in one year and then form a band.

Do they decide to do nothing for a year?

No. No. They decide to play a musical instrument.

What will each friend learn?

They decide to play a musical instrument.

How long will they have to learn?

For one year. They will have to learn how to play a musical instrument for a year.

What will they do at the end of the year?

Form a band. They will form a band at the end of the year.

So each friend spends 5 hours a day learning to play an instrument from scratch.

Does each friend spend 5 hours a week learning?

No. No. Each friend spends 5 hours a day learning to play an instrument. Not five hours a week.

How much time do they spend learning?

Five hours a day. They spend five hours a day learning to play an instrument.

What do they learn from scratch?

They are learning to play an instrument.

Do they already know how to play the instrument?

No. No. They are learning to play the instrument from scratch.

After a year, they meet, but they are all surprised.

Do they meet after six months to see how the progress is going?

No. No. They don't meet after six months. They meet after one year.

Are they all surprised?

Yes. They are all surprised.

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What happened when they met?

When they met after one year, they were all surprised.

It turns out they all learned to play the same instrument: the trombone.

Did they all learn to play different instruments?

No. No. They all learned to play the same musical instrument.

What instrument did they learn to play? The piano?

No. No. They didn't learn to play the piano. They learned to play the trombone.

So they couldn't form a band, but at least they developed creativity, confidence, patience, and cognitive ability.

Were they able to form a trombone-only band?

No. No. They were not able to form a band.

Did they develop creativity?

Yes. They developed creativity.

What about confidence?

Yes. They also developed confidence.

What two other things did they develop?

Patience and cognitive ability. They also developed patience and cognitive ability while learning to play a musical instrument.

Perfect! It's the end of this mini-story. And as you can see, through questions and answers, you can practice and improve your speech just like in a **real conversation**.
