In the UK, people enjoy drinking many **different kinds** of tea. However, the most popular tea in the UK is black tea.

**Black Tea**: People often put milk and sometimes sugar in it. Some famous black teas are English Breakfast Tea, Earl Grey, Lady Grey, Assam, and Darjeeling. **Green Tea**: is not as popular as **black tea** in the UK, but some people like it. It's healthy and comes from Japan and China.

Herbal teas, such as peppermint and chamomile, are caffeine-free and come in various flavors. People enjoy them because they can have a calming effect.
Chai tea has spices like cinnamon and ginger. Trust me, it's delicious when you add milk and sugar.

In short, to make tea, you need a **kettle**, a **teapot** and **tea**. :)

#### Kettle - Making Hot Water:

- To make hot water quickly, you use a kettle.
- Kettles come in two types: electric ones and stovetop ones.
- They heat water until it's boiling, and you can use this hot water for several things, including making tea.

#### **Teapot - Making Tea:**

- A teapot is a special container used for making tea.
- First, you put **tea bags** or **loose tea** leaves into the teapot. (Use any type of **black tea**.)
- Next, pour the hot water from the kettle over the tea in the teapot.
- You wait for a few minutes to make the tea stronger.
- Some people like to add milk or sugar to their tea, but not everyone does.
- Finally, you pour the tea from the teapot into cups and enjoy.
