How to Tell a Story in English Without Getting Stuck

Maybe you know this feeling. You start telling someone what happened yesterday, and your brain suddenly asks, "What tense do I need?" And then... silence.

Usually, you are trying to make every sentence perfect. But when you tell a story, your first job is simply to help the listener follow what happened.

Give one small piece of information, then the next. "Yesterday, I went to the supermarket. I wanted to buy milk. When I got there, I realized I had left my wallet at home."

You do not need long sentences. Just move from one event to the next.

Sometimes learners **get sidetracked**. Something else takes your attention, and you stop following the main idea.

A simple order helps: First... Then... After that... Finally...

Use **in the meantime** when two things happen around the same time.

Out of nowhere means suddenly and unexpectedly.

If something is different from what you expected, you can say it **turned out** differently.

You may **lose track of** a detail, and that is okay. You can **piece together** the story with simple words.

With practice, you will **get the hang of** it.

You can **keep someone in suspense** for a moment: "I opened the refrigerator... and you will never believe what I found inside."

Then **wrap it up** clearly. You can say: "**In the end**, everything was fine."

Now let us practice with a Point of View story. I will tell almost exactly the same story twice: first in the past, and then with the conditional. Listen to how the grammar changes while the story stays almost the same.

Past & Conditional

First, the past.

One morning, Emma was getting ready for work. She was already a bit late, but she was not too worried.

She wanted to leave the house, but suddenly she could not find her phone.

First, she checked her bedroom. She looked under the bed, on the nightstand, and under a pile of clothes, but the phone was not there.

Then she checked the bathroom. She looked next to the sink and behind the towels, but she still could not find it.

After that, she looked inside her bag, inside her coat, and even inside the car.

But the phone was nowhere to be found.

While she was looking, Emma found a box of old photos in the hallway.

She opened the box, saw a picture from a vacation five years earlier, and **got sidetracked** for a few minutes.

Soon she realized she was looking at photos instead of looking for her phone.

She closed the box and tried to remember what she had done earlier that morning.

She remembered making breakfast in the kitchen. She had her phone in one hand and a bottle of orange juice in the other.

So she went back to the kitchen. She checked the table, the counter, and the floor. Nothing.

Then, almost as a joke, she opened the refrigerator.

And there it was. Her phone was sitting next to the milk.

Earlier that morning, Emma had put the orange juice on the table and had accidentally put her phone in the refrigerator.

If Emma lost her phone again one morning, she would be getting ready for work. She would already be a bit late, but she would not be too worried.

She would want to leave the house, but suddenly she would not be able to find her phone.

First, she would check her bedroom. She would look under the bed, on the nightstand, and under a pile of clothes, but the phone would not be there.

Then she would check the bathroom. She would look next to the sink and behind the towels, but she still would not be able to find it.

After that, she would look inside her bag, inside her coat, and even inside the car.

But the phone would be nowhere to be found.

While she was looking, Emma would find a box of old photos in the hallway.

She would open the box, see a picture from a vacation five years earlier, and **get sidetracked** for a few minutes.

Soon she would realize she was looking at photos instead of looking for her phone.

She would close the box and try to remember what she had done earlier that morning.

She would remember making breakfast in the kitchen. She would have her phone in one hand and a bottle of orange juice in the other.

Very good. The story stayed almost the same, but the grammar changed. Listen to both versions again and notice the changes. You do not need to analyze them. Just listen and let your brain notice the patterns.
